The loss of civic awareness and purpose is the #1 challenge America faces as we prepare for the 250th birthday of the nation in 2026. The good news is, you need look no further than the pages of this annual report for signs of hope.

This is indeed a watershed moment for American civics. The Jack Miller Center is at the forefront of a bold civic education movement, grounded in the first principles of American constitutionalism, bolstered by dedicated citizens and civics leaders, and focused on creating highly-effective civic educators at all levels.



We are nearing the 20th anniversary since our first cohort of rising college professors came together for a two-week immersive fellowship program. Today, these Miller Fellows occupy leadership roles across American academia. And with more than 1,100 scholars who have joined our community over two decades, they form the core of this growing civics movement:

- Miller Fellows are building game-changing new Schools of Civic Thought at public universities, solidifying college-level civic education (pg. 9).
- Greater interest in civics is enabling **new programs for community college and law school faculty** (pg. 11-14), and the broader field of American history (pg. 16).
- Miller Fellows are introducing academic excellence to K-12 teacher preparation, reinventing professional development and graduate-level programs for high-impact civics teaching (pg. 17).
- Civics leaders, funders, scholars, and teachers are collaborating through the National Summit on Civic Education to create solutions and build momentum around university and K-12 civic education (pg. 25).
- Donors and alumni are underpinning these efforts by leveraging their influence and investing intentionally in projects that bolster the civic mission of our universities.

No cause is more important for the future of our self-governing society than preparing the rising generation for the privileges and the responsibilities of citizenship. With your friendship and support, the future is bright.

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
THE AMERICAN POLITICAL TRADITION PROJECT


Now, Miller Fellows are leading the civic education revival on campus, and are the primary source of talent for teaching positions in American politics, political theory, and history.

The Miller Fellowship Program

The Miller Fellowship begins with the JMC Summer Institute. Now in its 19th year, the rigorous two-week institute is widely recognized as one of the premier programs for identifying, training, and supporting emerging scholars of the American political tradition.

The 2023 Summer Institute in Philadelphia convened 20 young scholars to discuss "The Idea of Founding." These talented scholars join a network of over 600 Summer Institute alumni, providing continuous professional support and networking. JMC Scholars Lead New Schools to Revive Civics and the Liberal Arts

Schools of Civic Thought at Public Universities



ew independently-run schools and centers are emerging at public universities across the country to address a gap in the teaching and study of civic thought, the liberal arts, and the Western tradition in higher education.

These Schools of Civic Thought are built to fit the unique needs of their state and home institutions. Now, they are creating faculty positions in previously declining fields, fostering high-level civil discourse on campus, and enhancing K-12 civics education in their states.

For two decades, JMC has been strategically investing in scholars committed to the American political tradition. Many of the faculty and staff at SCTs are alumni of JMC programming, from the prestigious Miller Fellowship to other programs and events.

The Jack Miller Center plays a pivotal role in supporting these schools by recruiting faculty and leadership, developing curricula and programming, and advising on strategic expansion.

The Jack Miller Center Launches New Community College Initiative

Investing in Community College Faculty and Civics Courses

In August 2023, we hosted our inaugural community college educators seminar in Vancouver, Washington.

Community college professors from across the country gathered to discuss "The Sources of Freedom and Equality in American Political Thought." The seminar served as a pilot project to explore the unique needs of community colleges.

Our nation's community colleges serve a critical role in American education, teaching 41% of students across this country. Yet community college educators receive little professional development or educational support.

"This seminar enabled our cohort from a diversity of disciplines to dive deep into foundational ideas like equality and freedom," said Professor Robert Stevens of Tacoma Community College. "And for me, the discussion provided a thoughtful intellectual backdrop for my teaching practice."

Bringing the American Political Tradition Back to Law Schools




In February 2023, the Jack Miller Center convened law school faculty from across the country to discuss how to integrate the American political tradition into existing courses and opportunities for new course development.

Law schools, in their study of case law and precedent, have unfortunately neglected the foundations of the American legal system found in Enlightenment philosophy. The JMC Law School Initiative aims to increase the emphasis on political theory and America's founding principles and history in law school curriculum.

It's time to help our nation's lawyers—who play a critical role in forming and defining the laws of the land—develop a rich understanding of our founding history, ideas, and traditions.

Restoring American History in American Education

t this time when the serious teaching of American civics and history is so badly needed, the field of American history has fallen noticeably behind. History departments are being slashed, history courses are being removed from curricula, and many of the courses that remain are focused on ideological narratives.

In 2023, the Jack Miller Center launched the History Initiative to revive this vital part of civic education. By 2026, our goals are to:

- Increase the number of professors who teach American history
- Bolster the field of American history by supporting new published scholarship and professional development for historians
- Tell inspiring stories of American history to the public through popular media channels.
- Digitize important primary source documents that tell the American story on ContextUS.org



Our goal is to help K-12 history and civics teachers develop a mastery of the American political tradition. Since 2016, our Founding Civics professional development seminars have connected 2,100+ K-12 teachers with over 100 scholars from across the country to engage in the deep study of our country's founding ideas, documents, and history.

The demand for our innovative programs is clear. We reached a record number of teachers this year across 11 states, and we are expanding to 22 states by 2026.

Elite Yearlong Training Fellowship for Dedicated K-12 Civics Teachers

The Jack Miller Center concluded its second year of the premier American Political Tradition (APT) Fellowship, identifying top middle and high school teachers from around the country for participation.

The fellowship began with a weeklong institute at Admiral Farragut Academy in St. Petersburg, Florida, gathering 15 dedicated civics and history teachers to dive deep into primary source texts with leading scholars. Throughout the academic year, the fellowship continued with virtual sessions for the cohort of teachers to solidify their learning and discuss applications to their curriculum.

THE SECOND ANNUAL NATIONAL SUMMIT ON CIVIC EDUCATION

Civics Leaders and Funders Advance Solutions to the Civics Crisis

The Jack Miller Center and The Union League Legacy Foundation convened 200 civic education leaders at the National Summit on Civic Education on November 9-10, 2023 at the historic Union League of Philadelphia.

Founding principles-based civics organizations, leaders, scholars, and funders need a way to gather regularly, discuss emerging ideas and opportunities, and promote field-wide investments. The Summit was formed in 2022 to answer that call.

The 2023 conference focused on advancing a holistic approach to civics reform. Too often efforts to strengthen civics in the K-12 system are pursued independently of civics reform in higher education.

Sessions highlighted new, innovative projects and provided a forum for discussion on controversial issues. New partnerships, actionable ideas, and a much-needed dialogue were created between funders and practitioners for long term solutions.

Our work is just getting started.

THE CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

Dear Friends,

As of my 95th birthday on March 19th, 2024, I've retired as Chairman of the Board at the Jack Miller Center, making this my last official "Chairman's Message."

I am stepping down with great confidence JMC is becoming a powerful force in the nationwide movement for teaching American civics and history and will be long into the future. I have so many of you to thank for that—the dedicated educators and our forward-thinking donors—for believing in our mission and our country.

I started the Center because I wanted to make sure the American Dream, which I have lived and benefit greatly from, would be available to future generations. For our freedom to survive, the founders knew that every generation would need a basis of knowledge about our country and its founding ideals. So that is what we set out to do: put our founding principles and history at the forefront of education.

As JMC enters its 20th year, I am proud of what we have accomplished. We've provided training and leadership support to more than 1,100 scholars, who've taught 36,000+ undergraduate courses on 330+ campuses in 48 states. We've developed rigorous scholar-led content training programs completed by more than 2,000 K-12 teachers. Collectively, these teachers and scholars have taught over two million middle school, high school, and college students about our country.

We are now expanding our work to community college and law school faculty, building a consortium civics graduate program for K-12 teachers, and taking a leadership role in a blockbuster new higher ed movement: schools of civic thought at public universities (page 9).

All in all, we are making sure the nationwide civics movement grows and succeeds at all levels—and we are not alone. Some 200 civics leaders joined us for our 2023 National Summit on Civic Education to solve challenges and to collaborate. I can't wait to see what the 2024 Summit has in store.

I plan to continue in an active role on the Board as Chairman Emeritus, and I leave the chair in good hands with Michael Weiser, who formerly served as chair of the National Conference on Citizenship, chair of the HistoryMiami Museum, and as treasurer of the Jack Miller Center Board. He is a proven leader and passionate about our mission.

We believe that every generation should learn about the journey America has made in trying to achieve that vision in our Declaration of Independence that, "all men are created equal" and are endowed "with certain unalienable rights that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness."

That is the vision our founders gave us, a vision of individual freedom. By saying that "all men are created equal," they set a goal that America needed to work to achieve.

Today, a loud minority is trying to destroy that vision, what binds us together, what makes us *e pluribus unum*, "out of many, one." It is our shared history, our commitment to freedom, equality, and the rule of law, and our founding principles, enshrined in the Declaration and Constitution, that unite us, across differences, as Americans.

All of this has made us even more committed to the cause of getting the teaching of our founding principles and history back into our classrooms. It's a cause that rises above what the word partisan has come to mean—political identity and policy preference—and one that we believe all Americans should embrace.


